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On Predicational and Presentational Sentences
in English

This thesis is an attempt to characterize predicational and presentational sentences in English. I claim that there are at least three factors to consider in characterizing them: (i) the order of theme and location in the sense of Jackendoff (1972), (ii) the anaphoricity of an NP which is predicated of or presented, and (iii) the nature of predicates. Among these the first factor is emphasized. The basic notions of predication and presentation are defined in terms of this factor. These notions capture the determining characteristics of predicational and presentational sentences. Those cases which are not characterized correctly by these notions alone can adequately be handled by taking the factors (ii) and (iii) into consideration.

To support the analysis, rightward NP movement which is involved in deriving presentational constructions is examined in some detail. I argue that the previous analyses of the presentational constructions are inadequate in that they miss an important generalization about them. It is shown that there is a kind of semantic constraint imposed on rightward NP movement in general and that the constraint follows naturally from the proposed analysis.
